Winter is a wonderful time to attend a wine festival. The crowds tend to be smaller than those at fall or summer festivals, which means you'll have a chance to get to know the winemakers. Here are five festivals to consider.





#### FOR SKIING AND SIPPING

### SUN PEAKS WINTER OKANAGAN WINE FESTIVAL

Okanagan Valley, B.C.
Jan. 14-24

The Vibe: Skiing during the day and wine-drinking at night—this festival, held every year at Sun Peaks Resort near Kamloops, blends these two beloved pastimes pefectly.

The Lineup: Highlights include the first-ever Sun Peaks Wine Crawl—value-priced wines, snacks and tunes—and the Sun Peaks Progressive Tasting on Jan. 22, featuring wines from 30 wineries.

**Tip:** During the festival, various Sun Peaks restaurants, including Voyageur Bistro and Mantles Restaurant, will feature special menus paired with local wines. Reservations are recommended.
