Two wine festivals garnered \$8 million

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An event that offered magic lessons with David Blaine, among other auc-tion prizes, is working almost \$8 million worth of magic in Southwest Flori-

The Naples Winter Wine Festival, which took place in January, gave checks to 22 charities at a ceremony Sunday at the Naples Botanical Garden.

Other initiatives aimed fighting hung behavioral addressing health and increasing early learning programs also received checks, according to a news release.

For the 11th consecu-tive year, guests who paid to attend the auction and wine dinners at private homes bid on such items as a 1956 red Corvette, a 2011 Lexus hardtop con-vertible, an African safari and a trip to the Super Bowl.

Through the nonprofit Naples Children & Education Foundation, the result included checks ranging from \$25,000, to St. Matt's Camps for Kids Program, to \$1 million for the Boys & Girls Club of Collier Coun-

"Thanks to the generos-ity of festival supporters, we are providing a med-ical, academic and social

safety net" to the children of Collier County, said Bruce Sherman, who helmed the 2011 festival along with his wife, Cyn-

Tickets to the auction alone cost \$7,500 per cou-

That money will pay for a playground at the Immokalee Child Care at u. Center, pay therapis Catholic Charities therapists at those recovering from sex-ual assault and abuse, educate young children at the Guadalupe Center and provide lunches for needy children through a mobile pantry.

The 2011 grants put the wine festival total charitable donations at more

than \$90 million. "I hope we launch a new decade with a great success so we give a lot of long legs to the Naples Winter Wine Festival," Cynthia Sherman said shortly after the festival's

auctions. Organizers of Southwest Florida Wine & Food Fest, which took place in February, will present a \$1.25 million check to The Children's Hospital on Wednesday at HealthPark in Fort Myers.

The money will go toward five Giraffe bed incubators for the hospi-tal's neonatal intensive care unit.

This year's event netted approximately \$1.6 million, a 60 percent increase over 2010.
