SEPT. 18, 2012 STUDENTS RECEIVE GLASSES THANKS TO FLORIDA VISION QUEST PROGRAM

n Sept. 18, 100 Golden Gate Middle School students each received two free pairs of glasses — one for home and one for school — through the Florida Vision Quest program, which has screened and outfitted more than 170,000 at-risk or underprivileged students across the state since its inception. The vision initiative, funded by Naples Children and Education Foundation, provided around 100 students from Golden Gate Middle school with two prescription eye glasses. The students are among 7,500 Collier County children who are undergoing vision screenings. of pink translucent frames onto her face. "I can see all the way over there."

Trustees with Naples Children & Education Foundation, founders of Naples Winter Wine Festival, raised \$750,000 to pay for testing and frames for Collier County students. About 7,500 Collier County students were tested and about 20 percent are expected to need glasses.
